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Supporters of the present international dispute settlement system between private foreign investors and welcoming states usually highlight the fact that it has proven beneficial for both sides; it has positively contributed to the development of international investments in a globalized world, while promoting at the same time the international rule of law through institutionalized and formalized procedures. Nonetheless, the investor-state arbitration system has also attracted growing criticism, in particular in the context of TTIP and CETA, inter alia because

of its lack of transparency and the danger of limiting in some way the legislative and regulatory powers of sovereign states.

Professor Dupuy will intend to appreciate the overall value, efficiency and legitimacy of the system in the light of these contradictory assessments; he will also outline some emerging trends and discuss ways for actually reforming and bettering the system. The lecture will be followed by a discussion with the audience and a cocktail reception.
